



Chair Report

RICHELLE SIBOLBORO

FMC entered 2020 with vigour and a strategic focus on being Community Champions. We wanted to better service our members and our community in all facets of the organization.

The pandemic, like many other businesses and arts organizations, forced us to reassess our offering. For the first time, we had to come together as a greater artist community to weather this storm together. We were invited to the Director's Round Table that brought together all the major institutions in the Hamilton, Burlington, Dundas and Waterdown area. We came together to share their current situations as a result of the closures. We discussed new processes, how we could support each other and most importantly the next steps for us as a community with respect to operations, engagement and funding.



We are fortunate and lucky that motion arts and film translates itself beautifully online to viewing and engagement. We were able to transition from being a physical location to a virtual one and our programming continued to thrive in these times. Because we had established Operational Excellence the year before, we were able to quickly learn, test, try and adapt our current physical platform to new digital platforms and technologies. For this I need to recognize and thank Kristina Durka, Vic Wojciechowska, Sukaina Imam, Elisha Matharu, John Hill along with our volunteers and board members for working behind the scenes and rising to the challenge in such unprecedented times.

When we first set out to be Community Champions we were heavily investing in the Hamilton Region. To our surprise, going virtually allowed us to reach new audiences beyond our borders. We were able to engage individuals from Toronto, Niagara, Waterloo, Vancouver, Montreal, the United States, Mexico, England and Venezuela. This has given us great validation that the work we are doing and continue to do resonates with individuals here and everywhere. Locally and globally.

We will carry this momentum moving into our 3rd year of our strategic plan which is to be Media Activists. Yet, in all things virtual, we understand the importance a physical space plays in delivering immersive experiences, engaging workshops and creating serendipitous moments to meet and interact with one another. James Street North has been our home for so many years, but our current space does not allow us to truly thrive and transform into the Media Ecosystem we have set our ambitious sights on. This is why, in 2021, FMC will be moving to 366 Victoria Avenue North, situated in a new vibrant hub for media, art and culture in Hamilton.

Moving to this new location and situating ourselves in a media hub will create new opportunities and connections for our members in an industry that is rapidly growing within the City of Hamilton. It will enable our community to have greater access to appropriate space for media arts production, which will lead to a greater presence and presentation of artwork within the city. This cross pollination of industries will enable us to offer higher caliber workshops, improved facilities that support production, continued access to industry-standard equipment; and be in the centre of a collaborative environment for media arts creativity to flourish. We are excited to embark on this next chapter for FMC while ensuring a commitment to accessibility, inclusiveness and diversity within the industry.

Chair Report



Financial Report

NICHOLAS GERVAIS

I have worked as FMC's Treasurer for a year now and my experience has been nothing but positive. I'm an accounting assistant at McMaster University and have a background in finance. It's a privilege to experience the artists' works and work alongside such talented and dependable individuals such as the Board, Kristina, Wendy, our auditors and our members.

As of November 2020 FMC is in a healthy financial state. I am happy to report that FMC was awarded a 4-year multi-cycle operating Grant from Canada Council for the Arts, ensuring a steady foundation for us until 2024. FMC was also awarded Ontario Arts Council Operating Funding for 2020-2021. While 2020-2023 was meant to be a multi-cycle granting period with the OAC as well, they have still not juried the multi-year applications due to Covid-19 delays. We are awaiting instructions from their grant officers, and are anticipating the need to re-write a multi-year application reflecting the new challenges and changes to the cultural landscape brought on by the pandemic. Additionally, the City of Hamilton has continued to support our operations.

Our team has worked tirelessly to boost grant funding. For the first time since 2018, FMC was joined by contract staff funded through the Government of Ontario and Canadian Museum Association/Young Canada Works. FMC has also successfully leveraged our charitable status to seek new sponsorships and foundational funding through SHIFT 2020 and the Incite Foundation for the Arts to provide more support for our wide range of programs. With the contributions of our Funders, Sponsors, and Donors, FMC has increased our programming fees by approximately 38%.

Covid-19 has presented many challenges for us. During this time we received no Government relief emergency funds and have balanced out reduction in rental and membership revenue while continuing to provide support and services to artists. FMC had been without an acting treasurer for quite some time and has since become a charitable organization. This has opened new financial avenues for us.

On our way to improving financial health FMC has learned that the organization is entitled to a HST/GST rebate that has gone unclaimed since receiving charitable status in 2018. Going forward into the new fiscal year we will be claiming the rebates as well as going back to the previous years and claiming these rebates rectifying the issue and receiving a credit.

Any future surpluses will continue to be utilized for long-term organizational sustainability in our modernizing environment.

Thank you to Grant Thornton for one again providing their auditing services. It is our final year working with Anna Ruta. FMC is reaching out to our community partners and advisors to find a new auditor.

Thank you for allowing me to serve as Treasurer, our team will continue to work towards increasing financial sustainability in 2021.

Programming Report

2019 concluded with an exploration of FMC's archives, providing access to an informal archive of videos and exhibition ephemera that has accumulated here at FMC, through the program Not an archive, but an accumulation of traces.

2020 began with residencies by Minjung Hwangbo and Sonali Menezes, where each had a chance to focus on their practice and provide visitors insight into their work.

FMC was also pleased to support a behind the scenes look at the work of artists and filmmakers through:

- the rough-cut screening of The North Star: Finding Black Mecca by local filmmakers Angel Panag and Godfred Adjei, and
- the live coding performance and artist talk by FMC's remote artist in residence, Luis Navarro, which followed his weekly collaborative coding sessions.



To adapt and respond to the restrictions that arose, we also fast-tracked construction in the spring of a window presentation space. This window program was first launched with our Public Works program, featuring videos by four artists exploring modified environments and regional landscapes.

This window presentation space has since served as an invaluable space for programming during these challenging times. It has recently featured work by Layne Hinton in her Shadow Machines exhibition, where she reflects on early projection technologies, creating fascinating visuals in the process.

Online presentations and panels have also been a big part of this year, and we were please to host: a Q&A with artist-in-residence Katherine Rae Diemert following the launch of her online exhibition website, an online screening co-presented with the Inc by Steacy Easton, and our first ever Cell Phone Film Festival. Supported by McMaster's Shift 2020 program, the Cell Phone Film Festival featured new short films by 14 local and regional artists, all made to watch on your cellphone.

We have also recently reintroduced our Community Partnerships program, which provides access to professional media equipment and studio space, and leveraged our equipment and resources to support Hamilton Youth Poets' Poetic License Festival.

And keep an eye out for the show that artist Jessie Goyette has created for Cable 14, launching in January!





We Dug Through a Mountain of Gold to Find You was developed during a residency at the Klondike Institute of Art and Culture in Dawson, YK in 2016. It features activity in the placer gold mines that are located throughout the territory, where small crews (sometimes families) dig open pits and use water to melt the permafrost layer and extract gold. A biproduct of the process is the unearthing of ice age mammal bones, also frozen in the permafrost. A particular plant, known as a mastodon flower,







Each year FMC hosts the graduating exhibition for McMaster University's Multimedia Program. This was the first professional exhibition opportunity for these artists.



I am honoured to address Factory Media Centre's audience and membership here again this year as administrator. I am usually one of the first points of contact for visitors to our gallery and studio. When FMC closed its doors in March, I was fearful that the organization would lose the energy and momentum that our dedicated Board of Directors, volunteers, and staff worked to establish for this year.

Although it looks different, we have been tirelessly working behind the scenes to continue to offer our equipment rental services, membership incentives, and experimental media programming. To prepare for our big changes in 2021 we have been working towards preserving and establishing new community partners including: Cable 14, Cobalt Connects, Hamilton Artists Inc., Hamilton Black Film Festival, Hamilton Youth Poets, McMaster University, Opticks, Punk City Collective, Re-Create Art and Outreach Youth Studio, Winterfest, and Workers Arts and Heritage Centre.

Thank you once agiain to our funders: Canada Council for the Arts, Ontario Arts Council, Ontario Trillium Foundation, the City of Hamilton, and Incite Foundation for the Arts for their ongoing support necessary to serve our community. I would also like to Thank the Government of Ontario and Canadian Museum Association. 
