
This land is covered by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, an agreement between the Haudenosaunee and Anishinaabeg to care for the resources around the great lakes and preserve them for years to come. Because we inhabit this space, we should care for and protect this land, working towards preserving the natural environments surrounding us.

As a not-for-profit artist-run centre, Factory Media Centre is privileged to have opened a new media arts hub on stolen land, and with that in mind, we are committed to Indigenous sovereignty (sov·ren·ty) and ongoing collaboration with Indigenous peoples and indigenous media artists in our community.

In addition to acknowledging the land we physically inhabit, as a media art centre, working with digital technologies, we also have to acknowledge the land our digital selves inhabit, as well as to be aware that the technological devices we use are built through extractivist practices beyond Hamilton, affecting people and land across Turtle Island (North America), the Abya Yala (Central and South America), and other parts of the world.

Saying this, we recognize that we must do more to engage with the multi-layered politics and histories of the land we co-habit, the complex relationships that connect us all, and understand our roles as residents, neighbours, partners and caretakers.

Chair Report JESSICA RODRÍGUEZ (CHAIR)

I want to start my report by thanking our former and ongoing staff. First, I would like to recognize the work of Kristina Durka, who is officially on leave until May 2024. We should all appreciate her commitment and kindness to the centre in the past few years. I want to thank Alex Ramsay for stepping up as the acting operator for Factory in the last couple of months. It has been wonderful to work with Alex. I assure you he has the same passion and commitment for Factory Media Centre as Kristina. I also would like to thank our gallery assistant, Eli Nolet, who has been with us for around a year; if you have come to one of our events, you already recognized them because they have always supported us during our in-person events, perfectly documenting every moment. Finally, I would like to thank our board of directors, our sessional programming assistants for this year, and past and ongoing volunteers; without your work and support, we wouldn't be here talking about the amazing activities we completed this year.





Last AGM, I talked about the big task for the board, the staff, and the volunteers to move to a new location. This year, we focused all of our energy on activating this space with the work of local, national, and international artists, following our beliefs about opening new spaces for incoming artists, art/media students, struggling artists, minority communities, BIPOC artists, and immigrant artists. There is still work to do in this aspect, but we will continue working so artists feel welcomed in this space, keeping our promise to ensure our doors stay open and that our resources are always accessible to everyone. I would like to remind you all that we have exciting equipment that we purchased last year with the help of the Ontario Trillium Foundation, which is focused not just on Film but expanded audio-visual production into new territories such as Sound Design, Video Games, Augmented Reality, Virtual Reality, and Immersive Projection. Thanks to our volunteers, we are looking for ways to prepare introductory

materials so you feel comfortable exploring and experimenting with these new technologies.

This year, I updated FMC's land acknowledgement, the one I previously read at the beginning of this meeting. This is the first draft of what I would like to be a community effort to acknowledge our individual and collective positionality in terms of place and land, both regarding our community connections around Factory Media Centre's physical space here in Hamilton and the technological spaces that joined us all as media artists and that extend ourselves to other geographies. I also would like to share the following thoughts:





From my experience as an immigrant artist, I can say that getting to a new place is always exciting; everything is new and different, and you can only think about the new possibilities, thinking about yourself moving forward to the future. Same as me, Factory Media Centre arrived in a new space last year; we were all excited to finally have a home again in this old building and collaborative shared space with Evil Empire, opening our doors to our members and other artists, eager to see what the future will bring us. But now that we have settled down, it is time to think about our positionality as media artists and as a media centre.

First, I would like to talk about individual positionality, I would like you to feel your feet, the way they are grounded, touching the land you physically inhabit, the land of a city, a province, and a nation with conflicted realities. A land that you or your families stepped on recently or a long time ago, a land that was stolen by the powerful, the land of the Haudenosaunee and Anishinaabeg peoples that were displaced from here. Everything you see, feel and breathe, the land you cross daily, the birds you hear, the wild plants resisting change, and the polluted waters suffering from our presence. All this has personal and collective histories that go beyond our times and existences. As immigrants or immigrantdescendants now calling this land home, we must respect our surroundings, sharing the responsibility to preserve this land and everything that comes with it. We cannot look forward to the future without looking at this land's present and past lives.



As for our collective positionality, I want you to think about your presence beyond the physical position of your homes, moving from your feet up, crossing your guts, your arms, and your ears and going further away from your human flesh, connecting us all at a high speed where we can hear and see us together in "real-time" through our screens. We are all experiencing the digital selves of others, a co-presence that has extended the physical realm into the digital realm. But not everything is abstract and immaterial; our digital selves are part of a bigger system built with servers that inhabit multiple geographies beyond Hamilton (or the GTA). Those geographies are also physical lands where people are or were displaced by powerful companies and extractivism practices allowed and even incentivized by our governments. Displacement by war, economics, and politics is embedded in our current realities, and indirectly, we are part of this system, working with its technological products. As media artists, we all must acknowledge the damage on the lands that extend beyond our physical realities and collectively reflect on the role and position of Factory Media Centre in this context, re-imagining ourselves within the stories and lands connected to this physical building, the technological devices that we use, and the many artists that inhabit and will inhabit this collective space.




Financial Report

NICHOLAS GERVAIS (TREASURER)

This will have been my final year as treasurer and I am happy to share that as of the end of 2023 FMC is in a healthy financial state.

FMC's multi-year funding from Canada Council for the Arts is in place until 2026. With the Ontario Arts Council having multi-year funding, FMC will continue our application for grants in 2024. FMC has once again been generously granted contract staffing through the Government of Ontario Canada Summer Jobs Program and Canadian Museums Association/Young Canada Works for three contracts in 2023.





FMC continues to seek additional funding to sustain the organization's ambitious activities. In 2023 FMC received several grants including the Incite Foundation for the Arts for public and educational programming, Ontario Arts Council funding, City of Hamilton City Enrichment Fund, and Canada Council for the Arts Media Equipment Acquisition, and Hamilton Halton Brant Regional Tourism Association funding. We have also received a \$5k donation from Laurence Siegel to help fund member projects from Kire Paputts. In the new year our fundraising and development team will search for avenues of additional funding as we see fit to host our future programming in 2024-25.

I am lucky to work alongside a dedicated team including Kristina, though she's currently on leave, Alex our new Acting Operations Coordinator, Eli our Gallery Assistant, Tristan our new Programming Assistant, our bookkeeper Wendy, and the rest of the Board. I want to thank FMC's auditing firm, BLR LLP, including Vicki Wilson Johnathan Fennema. Thank you for allowing me to serve FMC as treasurer for these past few years, I look forward to seeing how Factory Media Centre continues to advance!



Programming Report NATALIE HUNTER

2023 was a year of *settling in* to our new space and finding comfort among its walls and in the larger community as we worked to establish more in-person events and programming; even reaching across regions and continents to do so.

FMC's 2023 programming featured the work of 22 artists and artists collectives through 3 residencies, 11 large-scale exhibitions, 4 workshops, and 3 artist talks. And we partnered with 6 organisations.



It Shapes Bodies

MARCH 24 - 31, 2023 HANNAH ESSEX, ARDYN GIBBS, AND PIPPA MACDONALD CURATED BY ELI NOLET

A collection of works displaying 3D models and video footage embodying the personal experiences held by the artists. This exhibition curated by Eli Nolet showcased the personal narratives and exploration of embodied experiences of queer vulnerabilities and realizations of desire that the three emerging artists convey.

APRIL 6, 2023 FACTORY MEDIA CENTRE

ScreenShare is a series of online events taking place in gather.town, promoting sharing, caring, and solidarity featuring soft art critiques and networking opportunities. Created by FMC's Winter 2021 Programming Assistants, John Hill and Tee Kundu, FMC intends to continue the program as long as there is interest from the community.



Virtual Vertigo

APRIL 28 - MAY 4, 2023 MCMASTER MEDIA ARTS

The McMaster Media Arts Class of 2023 presented their capstone media projects. These final projects were a culmination of research, development, and creation using skills learned in the Media Art program at McMaster University. The exhibit sought to create dialogue around the ever expanding digital and virtual world through mix media and mediums.



&NOW 2023: Train-ing: An Exaggeration MAY 8 - 12, 2023 DEREK JENKINS

A production residency which featured a technological analysis of the short film work Train-ing (2016), as the filmmaker subjected the images to various entangled and exaggerated methods of format migration and auto-critical reflection.



&NOW 2023: HEXES: Coded Language, Trancestor.AI, and Trans Oracles

MAY 18 - 26, 2023 MEL RACHO & ANGELIC GOLDSKY

An exhibit that focused on AI intervention and showcasing transgender AI processes and their intervention with artificial intelligences. The artists' aim was to illuminate the spirit of transgender life and poetics while revealing the shadows of binaries that resist the ethereal. There were four works shown: T4T Oracle, Coded Language: God Algorithm, ILLEGIBLE, and Trancestor.AI.



Khaleel Gandhi looked at these binds and presented a work that used double exposure to show the impacts of emotional trauma, and the feelings that are trapped inside us once inflicted, revealing the complex systems of emotional processing that often go unnoticed in our day-to-day lives.



AUTO{}Construcción

JUNE 15 - 28, 2023 MALITZIN CORTÉS

A live coding concert which utilized a video game engine to visualize architecture and critically analyze informal and run-down housing situations across countries like Mexico, the United States, Latin America, Asia, India, and part of Europe. The work used large handpicked image data sets to synthesize a resulting architectural structure, which was then followed by an audiovisual experienced motivated by live coding.





Live Immersive Coding Workshop

JULY 18, 2023 MALITZIN CORTÉS AND IVÁN ABREU

A workshop that had participants explore live cinema coding as a performative practice that uses live coding to sequence cinematographic shots, transform a 3D scene, animate actors, control light, process videos, etc, using Tidal Cycles, Processing, and Unreal Engine. The objective of the workshop was to explore the instructor's artistic practice and technological workflow.



Malitzin Cortes addressed the work in an artist talk before the performance, going into speculative architecture and resources such as machine learning, data visualization and construction of 3d environments to visualize the new styles after years of self-construction in the world, this being the core line of the work.

Equipment Report Stefan MacDonad-Labelle

Following the successful launch of FMC's new space within Evil Empire in Nov, 2022, we started the new year with our brand new editing (3x) and audio (2x) stations. In February, the committee moved remaining equipment stored at Hamilton Artists Inc over to FMC and then organized the rental inventory in our new space.



The new Blackmagic Pocket Cinema Camera 6k Pro's were fully tested to ensure proper function ahead of their rental listings. In March, the equipment committee approved a partnership with local director Kire Paputts to aid in postproduction facilities for his latest documentary.

In August, a member flagged an issue with one of our lenses, and it was ultimately found that the vendor had shipped us a unit with an incorrect lens mount. It has since been exchanged.

In September, the committee proposed several new options to utilize the remaining equipment budget, which would offer our members new digital photography rentals.

Looking into 2024, our committee is looking into new equipment options for rental to help bolster FMC's offering.



My name is Alex Ramsay and I have taken on the role of Acting Operations Coordinator for FMC while Kristina has taken a leave of absence. I would like to thank Kristina, our board, and the whole of Factory's community for making me feel so welcome and helping me through this transition.





In short, 2023 has been a year of change and growth. After years of maneuvering around the pandemic and a relocation from our former space on James Street North, we started 2023 at 366 Victoria Avenue North in the shared studio Evil Empire. For the first time since 2020, we began the new year with a space to call our own. Over the past year, our new location has been an incredible place for artistic exhibition and production. We've seen incredible artists activate the space with installations, video works, and live performance. Adrienne Bazir: New Board Member




